

Chichester District - People and Places

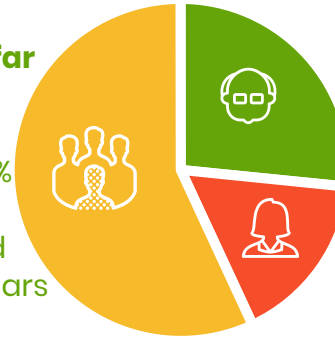
Residents 120,200

9% increase since 2007, in the main due to inward migration to the area from other parts of the UK, a similar increase is projected in next 10 years



Age Structure

The resident population has a **far older age profile compared with England**, with 16.5% aged 0-15 years (England=19%) and 26.6% aged 65+ years (England, 18%)



Poverty

6,400 Housing Benefits claimants in Chichester (May 2018)



- 70 children in temporary accomm
- 1,480 households on the council waiting list

2,000+ Children aged 0-15 yrs living in poverty

Getting Better



- **Teenage Pregnancy** has fallen considerably in Chichester.
- **There were 18 teenage conceptions in 2016**, down from 64 in 2008.

Life Expectancy has improved for men and women over the last 15 years.

80.4 years For **MEN**, life expectancy has increased from 77.9 years (2001-2003) to 80.4 years (2015-2017)

84.7 years For **WOMEN**, life expectancy has increased from 82.3 years (2001-2003) to 84.7 years (2015-2017)

At the time of the 2011 Census...



Over 3,750 people 65+ were carers

1,100 caring for 50 hours a week or more



8,500+ people 65+ lived alone and at greater risk of loneliness.



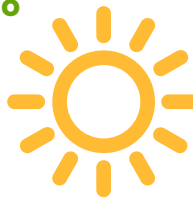
High rural population

In 2011 approximately 50% of all households lived in areas classified as rural by the ONS.

Chichester District – Challenges

Importance of the wider determinants of health



Road accident rate remains high

In the period 2015-2017 there were **316 killed and seriously injured (KSI) casualties** on Chichester roads. This represented a rate of 88.4 accidents per 100,000 population, the 3rd highest amongst comparable local authorities*



Need to reduce harms & threats to health



Screening Rates are low compared with similar local authorities

All of the screening rates below are above the England rate, but the screening rates for all are low in comparison with other similar authorities,



75.4% of women aged 50-70 **breast** screened in last 36 months (3 yr coverage), 3rd lowest of comparable LAs.



72.4% of women aged 25 - 64 attending **cervical** screening within target period (3.5 or 5.5 years) lowest of comparable LAs



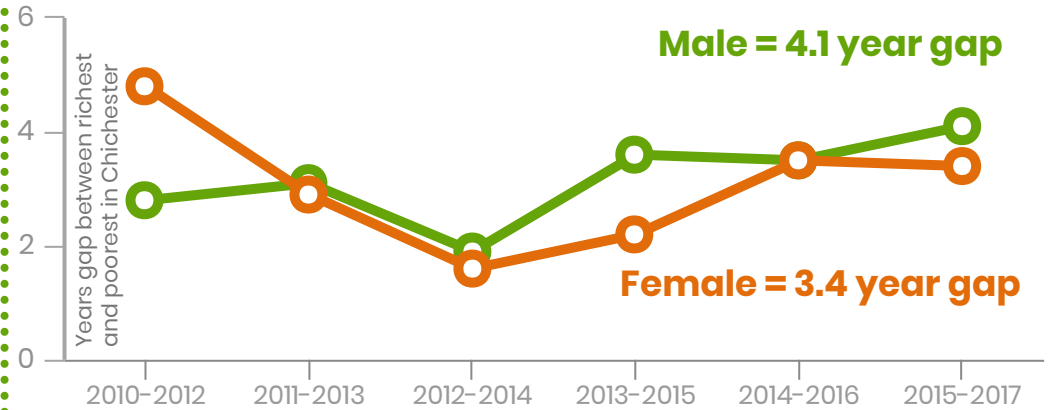
63.1% screened for **bowel cancer** in last 30 months (2.5 year coverage, %, 2017/18), 2nd lowest of comparable LAs.



81.8% The proportion of men eligible for AAA screened who are conclusively tested (2.5 year coverage, %, 2017/18), lowest of comparable LAs.

Inequality within the District

The gap between **life expectancy** of the people in the most deprived areas compared with the least deprived has increased in recent years, although the gap is lower than those observed elsewhere in West Sussex



Maximise prevention opportunities

Childhood Obesity



Approx. 14% of Year 6 pupils (10/11 year olds) are obese.

Alcohol



659 alcohol-specific hospital admissions in 2017/2018.



Smoking

Estimated 10,500 adults are current smokers (11% of 18+ population)

Physical Activity (and inactivity)



17% adults estimated to be **physically inactive** (spending < 30 minutes doing moderate intensity exercise per week).



71% adults estimated to be **physically active** (doing 150 minutes of moderate intensity exercise per week).
