Lives...including those of of babies and children...



In spite of the overall reduction in smoking rates of smoking in pregnancy in West Sussex have not changed significantly since 2010/11 remaining at 8.9%

The National Tobacco Control Plan (2017) outlines an aim to reduce smoking amongst pregnant women to 6% by the end of 2022.

In West Sussex....

Since 2012, 27 deaths among children aged under 1 year were attributed to smoking by the mother during pregnancy.

It is not just the mothers smoking that can cause harm. Smoking in the immediate environment of a baby in its first weeks, months and years of life with an additional 17 children aged under 1 year dying as a result of smoking in the household.

The impact on services is not confined to the NHS, in West Sussex, the total additional spending on social care as a result of smoking for adults aged 50 and over in 2018 was estimated at approximately £13,700,000

individuals, families...it is a big factor is sustaining poverty..the average cost of a pack of 20 cigarettes is over £10.



- 1 in 4 households with a smoker in West Sussex fall below the poverty line .
- If the costs of smoking were returned to the household, over 14,000 people in West Sussex would be lifted out of poverty.

Buying or selling cheap illicit cigs might not seem like a big deal – but it's bad news for our community:

The sale of illicit tobacco helps children buy cigarettes and get hooked on smoking. It also helps to fund the local criminals who supply it.



It makes it easier for children to get hold of cigarettes and to start smoking; Children are often aware who is selling illicit tobacco locally and at pocket money prices. Even if you don't think local sellers are selling to kids, many are.



The illicit tobacco trade is linked to criminals. People supplying it locally are often involved in drugs or loan sharking. Buying it means supporting crime and can put children into contact with criminals.



Cheap tobacco encourages smokers to keep smoking and to smoke more, and can break down their willpower to quit.
